

Professor Susan Brooks graduated from Nottingham University with a degree in Biology and moved to University College London Medical School, where she studied part-time for a PhD in pathology. During that time, she discovered that a chemical from the edible snail was able to distinguish between cancers that are able to spread from their original site to other parts of the body, and those that cannot. Following a period as a post-doctoral Research Fellow at the same institution, she joined Brookes in 1995. Since 2006, she has been in a split role, dividing her time between her research and teaching, whilst also acting as Director of Researcher Development responsible for researcher training and development across the University.

In this lecture, Susan will explore how, while still engaged in this fascinating work, she became increasingly involved in supporting and developing the careers of other researchers across the University and beyond.
