


# Urinary Tract Infection (UTI) in Care Home Residents

#### How do I know if someone has a UTI?

Any two new symptoms of the following:

- New onset or worsening of pre-existing confusion/agitation /drowsy
- Shaking /chills/high temperature >38.0°C or < 36.0</li>
- Dysuria difficulty or pain passing urine
- Urgency needing to go to the toilet quickly
- Frequency needing to urinate more often than normal
- Urinary incontinence unintentional loss of urine
- Pain in the side of the body or above the groin area
- Blood in the urine

#### **Urine Colour**

A general rule of adequate hydration is that the clearer and lighter the urine the better.

1-3 is healthy pee, 4-8 you must hydrate Remember: various medications and vitamins can alter the colour of the urine.

# How can I help?

The elderly often

do not know they are thirsty.
They should drink around 1500-2000 mls (6-8 glasses) each day.
Offer drinks regularly throughout the day.
Help them to have their drink.
Give them

choices of cups

and drinks.

### Hydrate: Offer more drinks
